Join The Friends' At A Very Special Fundraising Event: A Late Afternoon At the River



The Friends of the Thomas Balch Library are inviting local history buffs on September 25 to "A Late Afternoon at the River," its fourth annual fundraiser to support the activities of the Library. The event will take place at four o'clock in the afternoon at Riverside on the Potomac, the 18th century home of Travis and Suzi Worsham on the river just north of Leesburg.

Guests will enjoy fine wine and delicious hors d'oeuvres, from Savoir Fare, of Round Hill while strolling about the beautiful grounds of the historic farm, located on the site of one of the original ferries across the Potomac. Then they will assemble under a tent to hear a lecture by Dennis E. Frye, Chief Historian and Chief of Interpretation, Education & Parnerships at Harpers Ferry National Historical Park . Frye will speak about "The Potomac: International Border between North and South."

To add to the guest's enjoyment, an exciting raffle will take place featuring items and activities related to local history. A sampling: an authentic Civil War bank note; a private tour of Loudoun & Mosby's Confederacy; a 'basket of cheer' from Barboursville Vineyards; a champagne brunch for 10 guests at a delightful 18th century house and gardens; a studio portrait sitting with Sarah Huntington; a garden consultation with a renowned garden expert, along with a gift certificate for plants and accessories; and other valuable and interesting offerings.

The Worshams have been working for some time to restore the old house and adjacent log cabins, developing landscaping and terraces overlooking the farm's original pond, and rebuilding the barns. This is a private residence that has never been opened to the public before. Don't miss this opportunity to see and enjoy this interesting and historic home.

The Thomas Balch Library is a library of history and genealogy owned and operated by the Town of Leesburg. Friends of the Thomas Balch Library is a 501 (c) 3 foundation established to support and supplement the activities of the Library. Friends' Groups Honor Student Historians

Loudoun County Public School Social Science Fair awardees – June 2011

To encourage students' interest in history in general, and particularly the history of Loudoun County and the Commonwealth of Virginia, three groups closely involved with Thomas Balch Library, are at the forefront of that effort. Supporting the Loudoun County Public School's annual Social Science Fair since 2008, the **Thomas Balch Library Advisory Commission (Town of Leesburg)** this year honored Olivia Corso, a rising sophomore at Tuscarora High School, for Excellence in Local History Research. Olivia's topic "Who Did the Battle of Ball's Bluff Affect and How Did It Change the Lives of the Men Involved?" Olivia's research took her to Thomas Balch Library, Balls Bluff Battlefield, Rust Library and the Union Cemetery. Olivia has been invited to present her research project at the Loudoun History Awards in November.

The Black History Committee of Friends of the Thomas Balch Library's annual award went this year to Alex Hunt, Dominion High School student, for his exceptional PowerPoint presentation entitled "What was segregation like in Londoun County, Virginia, between 1920 and 1969?" Alex showed his excellent presentation at the July meeting of the Black History Committee and there he received his award, that included a check and copies of all BHC publications.

The committee also welcomed William F. Brazier, Supervisor of Social Sciences Instruction for the Loudoun County Public Schools. Mr. Brazier's attendance made possible his exposure not only to the vast resources of local and state history at Thomas Balch Library, but also the publications produced by the Friends and the Black History Committee.

Friends of the Thomas Balch Library recognized Grace Dreyer, a rising senior at Potomac Falls High School with the Local or Virginia History Award for her presentation on "How have American artists helped to shape and reflect America's unique cultural identity throughout history?"

Board member Wynne Saffer served as judge for the category, and Board member Harriett Condon presented Ms. Dreyer with her award. This talented young woman also has been recognized by her school for her design and constructions of their traditional Senior Stained Glass window for the 2012 year, shown here. The window will be installed in the lobby of the school.

A very large hole in the ground, just off Plaza Street in Leesburg, was once Frederick Douglass School, opened in 1958 as a segregated elementary school in Leesburg proper, for African Americans. Desegregated, following the 1968-69 Supreme Court ruling, it served all races until closing and becoming a LCPS support facility. That building will be replaced with the new two story Frederick Douglass Elementary School, planned to open 2012-2013.

The Director's Letter

Greetings:

As a way of addressing pressing space constraints alternate methods of expanding our research collection have been undertaken. For several years the Friends of the Thomas Balch Library, Inc. have assisted the library in this endeavor by underwriting the cost of some of its digital subscriptions such as set up fees for JSTOR and annual subscription fees for America's Genealogy Bank and America's Newspapers. These three subscriptions are heavily used and widely recognized as significant assets by researchers. Two recent additions to our digital offerings, parts of Gale Cenage Learning Corporation's Archives Unbound are: "We Were Prepared for the Possibility of Death" Freedom Riders in the South, 1961 which contains documents from the FBI library concerning the Freedom Rides and is a fitting addition to our collection during this the 50th anniversary of the rides and The Civil War in Words and Deeds which contains regimental histories, personal narratives, and other sources of significant historical value from the period between 1860 and 1865.

In May Thomas Balch Library was the recipient of Loudoun Preservation Society's (LPS) first Katherine "Kitty" Boyd Grant. We are honored to have been so selected. The grant (\$5,000), awarded for our application to process and digitize WAGE Radio tapes and memorabilia in our collection, will enable us to start phase one of the project. Phase one will cost \$12,000 with full funding achieved by blending the LPS grant with funds from the Loudoun Laurels (INOVA) oral history grant and assistance from Friends of the Thomas Balch Library.

Due to straightened economic times Thomas Balch Library, as with other departments within the Town of Leesburg, has experienced staffing reductions. In the FY2012 Budget one position was eliminated and one left unfunded. While there have been no reductions in programs, the library will now be closed for entire holiday weekends rather than just the holiday. These closures, posted on our website, are spread throughout the year, enabling the library to continue providing patron access seven days a week and two evenings.

Elsewhere in the newsletter you will find a list of newly catalogued books and manuscript collections. Programs and exhibits for the fall and classes through June 2012 are also to be found elsewhere in the newsletter.

As always it will be my pleasure to welcome you when visiting Thomas Balch Library or when attending our programs and exhibits.
