## Whitehorne Gives Gripping Account of 1814 Niagara Campaign

Lt. Col. Joseph W. A Whitehorne (U.S. Army Ret.) gave the Friends of the Thomas Balch Library a gripping account of the struggle between U.S. and British forces in the Niagara campaign of 1814 at the annual fundraising gala, held August 18 at historic Birkby House in Leesburg's old town.

The beautiful white pavilion in the formal gardens of Birkby House was an improbable backdrop for Dr. Whitehorne's meticulous, and sometimes grisly, account of the battles which raged up and down the short Niagara River, which flows out of Lake Erie and drops 165 feet to the

level of Lake Ontario. Even as Washington was burning, far greater losses were taking place on the Niagara Frontier.

Fort Erie had been constructed on the Canadian side in 1767 in a strategic location at the junction of Lake Erie and the Niagara. It was directly across from the U.S. shipyard and later military encampment at Black Rock, a few miles north of Buffalo. The opposing armies kept crossing the river at this point, each creating devastation on both sides.

At the northern end, where the Niagara flowed into Lake Ontario, Fort George on the Canadian side faced the massive Fort Niagara, originally constructed by the French, on the other. Fierce fighting took place around the forts, which were taken, abandoned, and retaken as the battles raged back and forth. In the end both Fort Erie and Fort George were destroyed, and the toll of battle was counted in thousands dead on both sides.

Although American historians have considered the War of 1812 as "The Second War of Independence," its interpretation depends upon the view of the observer. "The Canadians know that they won it," said Dr. Whitehorne. "The Americans think that they won it, and the British know nothing about it," he added.

In 1987, workmen building a subdivision at Snake Hill, just south of the restored Fort Erie, uncovered human remains. This discovery triggered an archeological survey of what proved to be the orderly burial of 31 young men. Virtually nothing remained except the bones and the uniform buttons which proved them to be all U.S. troops slain in the battles.

Dr. Whitehorne, as a U.S. Military Historian, was called in to be a technical advisor to the excavations. Forensic analysis led to many deductions. All the bodies were buried with their feet to the west, according to the Christian custom of being prepared for the Resurrection.

The average age of the dead was 22, and, surprisingly, they were six feet tall. Their bones contained little lead, suggesting that they were rural or lower class—the upper class ate from pewter plates (a lead alloy), while ordinary folk did not. Bone lesions where muscles had been attached showed a life of heavy labor. Worst of all was the appalling effect of 19th century artillery: In 26 complete skeletons, there were 56 fractures. All of the remains were returned to the United States and buried as heroes with military honors.

### Did You Know?

As promised in our Summer issue, we are continuing our interesting and informative series of *True or False* and Did You Know segment, as compiled and presented last October, by Donna Bohanon, Events Coordinator for the Black History Committee at the dedication of the new Frederick Douglass Elementary School in Leesburg:

#### True or False

There is a mural at the Thomas Balch Library depicting the entire history of the African Americans in Loudoun County.

**True:** There are two murals at the Balch that honor African Americans in Loudoun County.

On November 2, 2002 at the Balch Ball, the Friends of the Balch Library proudly presented a mural now placed below the skylight in the library's Margaret Mercer Room. Painted by renowned muralist William Woodward, the mural is comprised of four 29"x 22" panels depicting four aspects of Loudoun County history. One of the panels references one aspect of African Ameri-Americans and commissioned William Woodward to cre- www.balchfriends.org/amural.htm.) ate another work of art; a painting that depicts other aspects of African American life, history and contributions to Loudoun County. The images include an African American stone mason, an African American family (past to present), a Church, African American horsemen, and a World War II Soldier.

### Did you know?

African Americans played an important role in Loudoun County's equestrian community; as highly successful horsemen and jockeys African American horse events such as the Colored Horse and Colt Shows were once held at the Emancipation Grounds in Purcellville and in St. Louis near Middleburg. Some notable African American Horsemen were Silas Randall, Colonel "Knot" Brooks and Chauncey Brown. ## News from the Library Director:

Thomas Balch Library continues to thrive and collections grow because of ongoing support from the community and visitors from across the country. In June the Ketoctin Chapter of the NSDAR, a longtime supporter of Thomas Balch Library, donated *New York in the American Revolution: A Source Guide for Genealogists and Historians* by Eric Grundset. This is the first in a series of volumes projected to cover the original thirteen colonies.

Often the library receives collections related to families in the area. These frequently include invaluable but inadequately identified images of people. One such collection, Cooper Fry Scott Family Papers 1816-1950 (M76), was recently processed by Lisa DeZarn, a Library Associate. The grandson of Nicholas, William Martin Fry (b.1833), married John Cooper's daughter, Mary Amanda, on 03 January 1856 in Loudoun County. At the time of their marriage, William was listed in the census as a shoemaker.



Together, Mary Amanda Cooper Fry (10 March 1833-22 April 1917), and William Martin Fry (b.1833), had ten children: Sarah C. (b. 1857), Anna (b. 1859), John W (1861-16 January 1922), Charles H. (b.1863), Ida (b.1865), Rose Mary (b. 1868), Eliza L. (b. 1869), Frank (b. 1870), Mary M. (Mattie) (1871-5 December, 1937) and David T. (b. 1874).

The photograph (vc\_0047\_008) entitled "Amanda Cooper Fry's Children" remains a mystery. Which children? Any assistance in identification would be appreciated. We could use help in identifying a number of other individuals depicted in photographs in the Cooper Fry Scott Family Papers (M 076). Please contact <a href="balchlib@leesburgva.gov">balchlib@leesburgva.gov</a> or call 703-797-7195 if you are able to provide positive identification on this photograph or others in this collection.

### There are Books for Sale at TBL!

A short time ago, we were asked why a particular work by a local author was not included on our Publication Order Form in the *Chronicle*. While we explained that listing includes publications funded by the Friends of Thomas Balch Library, Inc., we realized there are a number of books, videos, and pamphlets available for sale at Thomas Balch Library. Many of these are the result of the talent and effort of local authors and artists. We think they should receive some exposure and publicity. All items sold by the library help fund its work through the Town of Leesburg.

So, how do you find them? We draw your attention to a handsome revolving kiosk located near the entrance of the John Janney Room at TBL. Here you will find sample copies of these publications, arranged by topic such as Towns and Villages; Photographic History; Churches and Cemeteries; Loudoun Transportation; Abstracts and Legal Records -even Old Fashioned Recipes.

For instance, you will find In Their Own Words: Recollections of an Earlier Loudoun by photographer Sarah Huntington and author Gail Waldron. who, in 2001 interviewed and photographed, and thus preserved, thirtytwo memory and images of some of Loudoun's seniors, presented with a Foreword by author and Pulitzer Prize Poet Henry Taylor.



Included are DVDs, such as 300 Miles to

Freedom produced by Richard Bryer. Another outstanding DVD available here is Nichols: The Last Hardware Store, produced by Lincoln Studios. And you will find The Bulletin of the Historical Society of Loudoun County, Virgina, featuring articles by members, on a wide number of topics. One treasure is the hardcover volume of the Bulletins for 1957-1976.

Often available is the most recent Balch Program speakers' book, in case you didn't pick one up at the lecture. These tend to be in short supply, so check them out as soon as possible following the lecture.

You will find Index Loudoun County Land Deed Books, A-Z, 1757 through 1845, and Index Loudoun County Wills, 1757 through 1850. Also Loudoun County Births, 1853-1896 and Loudoun County Census 1810 through 1920.

Of course, included in the display is the complete catalogue of the Friends' publications, including those of the Black History Committee. Incidentally, one of the best-sellers at the library continues to be the five volume Loudoun Discovered: Communities, Corners & Crossroads by local historian and mapmaker Eugene M. Scheel. These are available for order by phone, or use the order form here.


We plan to provide a sample or two of interesting books for sale in each issue, for your information.
